National Conference on **Redefining Experimental Pharmacology**



Dr. Vivek Tyagi, Senior Consultant at CCSEA, New Delhi, emphasized that researchers must strictly follow ethical guidelines while using animals in scientific research. Although research plays a crucial role in human development, maintaining ethical standards during experimentation is the responsibility of every researcher.

A two-day national conference titled “Redefining Experimental Pharmacology” concluded on Saturday at Vignan’s University, Vadlamudi, in Chebrolu Mandal of Guntur district. The conference was organized by the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences under the School of Biotechnology and Pharmaceutical Sciences, with financial support from CCSEA (Committee for Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals). The event was conducted under the theme “Ethical, Alternative, and Digital Frontiers.”

Addressing the gathering as the chief guest, Dr. Vivek Tyagi stated that while conducting experiments using laboratory animals, researchers must ensure animal welfare, obtain necessary approvals, and conduct experiments in ways that minimize pain and suffering. He stressed that the ethical guidelines framed by CCSEA must be strictly followed by all researchers.

He also highlighted the importance of adopting modern research approaches such as reducing the number of animal experiments, minimizing discomfort to animals, and utilizing alternative methods and digital technologies whenever possible. Dr. Vivek Tyagi explained that following the 3Rs principles—replacement, reduction, and refinement—helps ensure ethical and responsible research practices.

Another chief guest, Dr. N. Harish Shankar, a scientist at ICMR–NIN, Hyderabad, explained



that animal models play a vital role in medical and pharmacological research. They help scientists study disease patterns, understand drug effects, and evaluate the safety and effectiveness of new medicines before clinical trials in humans.

Dr. S. Ramakrishna, Chief Scientist at CSIR–IICT, Hyderabad, noted that animal-based research contributes significantly to studies on diseases such as cancer, diabetes, cardiovascular disorders, and nutritional deficiencies.

More than 350 students from 20 colleges participated in oral and poster presentations. Winners were awarded prizes, certificates, and mementos. The event was also attended by Dr. J. Mahesh Kumar, Chief Scientist, CSIR–CCMB, Hyderabad; Dr. K. Suresh Babu, Chief Scientist, CSIR–IICT, Hyderabad; and Dr. M. Vijay Kumar, Associate Professor, Dayanand Sagar University, Bengaluru, along with deans, heads of departments, faculty members, and students.


